

Speakers



Associate Professor Eleonora Feletto leads the Gastrointestinal Cancers Policy & Evaluation Stream at the Daffodil Centre, a joint venture between the University of Sydney and Cancer Council NSW. Her current work focuses on prevention and early detection of colorectal and liver cancer in Australia and overseas. She is currently working on major national and international projects assessing liver cancer control in the Western Pacific Region and in Australia. Her work seeks to identify gaps in liver cancer prevention, early detection and management and use evidence to guide policy and investment to improve liver cancer outcomes. These projects are part of collaborative efforts with the World Health Organisation, the Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care & The Prevention Centre.



Professor Stuart Roberts is the Head of Hepatology at the Alfred Hospital, and former Chairperson of the GESA Clinical Research Network with Fellowships from GESA, AASLD and the AGA. He is clinical lead on the National HCC Clinical Quality Registry while his main research interests are hepatocellular carcinoma, viral hepatitis, autoimmune hepatitis, fatty liver disease, and non-invasive markers of liver disease.



Dr Joachim Worthington is a Research Fellow at the Daffodil Centre, with a focus on mathematical modelling. His current research is on using predictive modelling to estimate the potential impact of colorectal cancer and liver cancer screening and early detection in Australia, and using economic analysis to provide cost-effectiveness results for policy decision-making.



Amanda McAtamney is a health policy professional working as Manager of Public Health Policy at Cancer Council Australia. She has a Masters in Policy and Applied Social Research and a Bachelor of Arts (Sociology). Amanda's current portfolio of work focuses on the development and promotion of evidence-based cancer prevention, screening and early detection policy to the Australian Government and the wider community, and influencing the delivery of cancer control policy, research, treatment and care to reduce the impact of cancer in Australia.
